

## DID YOU KNOW?





The Recycling Council of Ontario estimates that **3.2 million tons** of recycling is downgraded to landfill waste annually because of improper sorting or contamination — that is the weight equivalent of over 27 CN Towers.

When non-recyclable and contaminated recyclable (not cleaned of food or beverage waste) materials are found in the recycling system, it prevents all items in the entire receptacle from being recycled.



Any recyclable items that are contaminated with food or other waste cannot be recycled and are automatically diverted to waste.

WHAT YOU CAN DO



Ensure all food waste is deposited in organics bins.



Ensure paper materials are separated from glass, cans, plastics and coffee cups.



Empty and clean all food and beverage containers before disposing in recycling bins.



Understand your waste and recycle streams and sort accordingly. Ensure you know what is accepted at your home versus at the workplace.\*

### FOOD TAKE-OUT CONTAINERS

STYROFOAM & WAX-LINED CONTAINERS → GARBAGE



PAPER AND PLASTIC CONTAINERS → RECYCLING



COMPOSTABLE CONTAINERS → ORGANICS





#### COFFEE CUPS → RECYCLING



Disposable coffee cups in their entirety (cups, lids & sleeves) are to be recycled with glass, cans & plastics. Please ensure all liquid is emptied before recycling.



#### FACE MASKS & DISPOSABLE GLOVES → GARBAGE



During the pandemic, the global consumption rose to an estimated average of 129 billion disposable face masks and 65 million pairs of disposable gloves per month. By the end of the pandemic, it is possible there will be more disposable face masks in the ocean than jelly fish. It is crucial to dispose of these materials properly in garbage bins.
